What are the most enjoyable and most challenging parts of studying English?

Where do you see yourself in the next 5 years?

How do you manage your study time when running your very own youtube channel?

WHAT'S INVOLVED?

Below is a summary of each workshop...



A dog groomers role is not just playing with dogs all day, it is a highly skilled profession. Proper grooming starts with understanding what a dog was bred to do. Groomng isn't just aesthetic. You will need good communication skills, the ability to handle a dog firmly but gently, and a good eye for detail.

Lara has worked in the digital sector for over 25 years, before the internet was even invented! When she left uni, she has no idea what she wanted to do and initially workds as a project manager in a digital publishing company. After working for a range of publishers, she has since worked for digital agencies in London and Paris as a free lance digital consultant working actoss a range of big companies, and in the last 5 years she has worked in charity sector for the Royal Horticultural Society and now Age UK



My workshop is an introduction into the veterinary field, with a focus on the wider aspects of veterinary including clinical, research and public health. I'm currently a university student at the Royal Veterinary College and I will outline my decisions, as apart of my Bishops' journey which has led me into my prospective career. My journey has involved lots of hands on experience which should highlight the importance of work experience in any career. Through interesting anecdotes, I hope to share and inspire the characteristics I have gained, in order to be a life long learner.

My name is Samantha and I left BHGS after Sixth Form in 1991. I joined the Civil Service and have enjoyed a varied career for 25 years. I am a Partnership Manager in the Department for Work and Pensions, managing relationships outside government to benefit local communities. At my workshop you will hear about the variety of roles available within Central Government and some of the routes into those careers





This workshop led by Kaelin Newton and Alison Kiernan from Detectortesters, a local manufacturing company, will focus briefly on HR but more significantly on Engineering with a link to STEM subjects (Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths). From an HR perspective the workshop will focus on HR as a career, what it entails, routes to entry and career opportunities. Kaelin, a recent Engineering graduate, will then outline her journey to a role in Engineering, the wide variety of career opportunities arising from a focus on STEM subjects and their importance for the future.



My workshop will be all about studying Medicine/Dentistry and studying abroad, that being one of the biggest decisions I've made in life so far. I will be giving you an insight into Medical/Dental school, the journey, the ins and outs, ups and downs, requirements and skills needed. I will also give you an insight into what it's like to study abroad, something quite different to studying in the UK. Above all I want to inspire you and show you the results come out of resilience, not giving up and hard work!

This workshop is led by Sarah McCready, who left the sixth form at Bishops' Hatfield Girls' School in 2008, and is now Head of Social Infrastructure at Dorchester Group of Companies. Dorchester are a master planner and house builder, and Sarah's role is to plan for, manage and deliver all non-residential facilities and amenities on large mix-use housing schemes. The workshop will explain why a career in urban design is so fulfilling, and what soft skills are needed to manage complex technical projects in the absence of having a technical background



This workshop is led by Adesola Akerele, who is currently studying English Literature at Warwick University. Adesola has established her very own personal brand through the means of running a YouTube channel and creating her very own documentary series 'The Clay Jars project' which was premiered on Warwick University campus and on their website. This workshop will focus on what it takes to develop yourself creatively and how you can gain the confidence to build your very own personal brand.

This workshop will be led by ex students Molly Davis and Ellen Daly who attended bishops from 2007-2014. Both having studied for two different degrees at University of Hertfordshire, they will discuss their particular journeys studying for Law and History. The aim of this workshop is to advise the girls who may be considering a similar route, but also explaining more generally what can be done outside of studying to enhance employability skills for their future. Molly and Ellen will also be able to demonstrate the benefits of staying at home for University and the alternative opportunities/ experiences you can have, such as, working/ studying abroad



This workshop will focus on a career within the Sales & Marketing industry and will be run by Jessica Davis. Jessica currently manages the sales and marketing for late night venues and runs her own online boutique, which started through the power of Social Media Marketing!

Jessica will speak about leaving school at the age of 15 and going straight into full time work through the route of an apprenticeship and the difficulties and achievements of her professional journey through the past 5 years.

Harrods

Abbie Porter: Harrods School Leaver Programme

What A Levels did you take? Geography, History, Sociology, AS Biology & Extended Project What did the process of application involve? An initial online apliation, including my CV, answering questions based on values, and completing an online scenario test. The next stage was an online interview where I recorded myself answering eight unseen questions. The final stage was attending the assessment centre, where I completed a SWOT analysis of my chosen department to present. I had a one-to-one interview and group tasks. The news of acceptance came within a week!

Were there any preconditions to your application? I had initially applied for university but changed my mind after receiving my offers. To be successful, you must be organised, confident and driven, with a passion for luxury retail. You musy have be completing/have completed A Levels within the last academic year and have grades A* - C in GCSE or equivalent in English and Maths

What type of work do you do? In my first six months I worked in Burberry menswear, where I had to serve high end clients, manage stock, and complete trade reports. My second placeent is in soft furnishings, where I have worked since March. Each day is different; my roles include helping clients select colour themes and fabrics, and even visiting Chelsea Harbour design centre for training. The variety is what I love about working at Harrods.

What are your plans for the next 2-3 years? My final placement will start in September and I hope to gain more responsibility within the team, and start hosting team briefs. When I finish in February 2018 I hope to aply for the management programme. In the distant future, I would love to go into out learning and development team, working on projects and hosting training sessions
