CAREER INSIGHT: INTERVIEWS WITH AN ALUMNA MEMBER – ISOBEL GRANT

Introduction

Hi, my name is Isobel Grant and I left Bishop's in July 2016. I studied Biology, Psychology and History at A-Level, as well as completing an Extended Project Qualification which investigated differences in conservation efforts between the critically endangered black rhino, and the vulnerable red panda.

What are you doing at the moment academic wise?

I have completed my second year at the University of Southampton, where I study a 3-year Bachelor of Science degree in Zoology.

Why did you decide to study your course?

I decided to study Zoology because I've always had an interest in animals, especially in terms of their behaviour, evolution and the importance of conservation for endangered species. Zoology was a great way to combine my love of biology with my love for animals, and incorporate elements of psychology.

What has been a highlight of your University experience so far?

One of the highlights of university was definitely the field trip to Spain in my first year of university. I had the chance to see such a diverse range of vertebrate and invertebrate species, even managing to see an octopus up close and go chameleon searching at night!

Where are you off to this Summer? How did you manage to secure it?

As part of my dissertation research, I will be jetting off to Madagascar for 6 weeks to study the Human-animal interactions between humans and Sifaka lemurs, and the negative impact these may have. This is a project run through the wildlife conservation research organization Operation Wallacea.

Advice you would give your 15 year old self?

It's okay to change your mind about things! When I began to debate the prospect of going to university, I would often chop and change my mind of what degree I wanted to pursue. It's so important that you choose a subject that you have a real interest in!

I am currently a History student at Oxford University approaching my third and final year in October.

Why did you decide to study your course?
