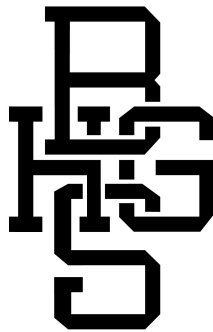

HEALTH AND SAFETY POLICY

Bishop's Hatfield Girls' School

PART 1 STATEMENT OF INTENT

The Governing Body of Bishop's Hatfield Girls' School will strive to achieve the highest standards of health, safety and welfare consistent with their responsibilities under the Health and Safety at Work Act 1974 and other statutory and common law duties.

This statement sets out how these duties will be conducted and includes a description of the establishment's organisation and its arrangements for dealing with different areas of risk. Details of how these areas of risk will be addressed are given in the arrangements section.

This policy will be brought to the attention of all members of staff [a reference copy is kept on the Google drive].

This policy statement and the accompanying organisation and arrangements will be reviewed on an annual basis.

Bishop's Hatfield Girls' School has subscribed to the service and support provided by the 'Education and Safety Team' at HCC.

This policy statement supplements Hertfordshire County Council's (HCC) Health and Safety Policy.

PART 2

ORGANISATION

As the employer, the Governing Body has overall responsibility for Health and Safety.

At school level duties and responsibilities have been assigned to staff and governors as laid out below.

Responsibilities of the Governing Body

The Governing Body is responsible for ensuring health and safety management systems are in place and effective.

As a minimum these systems should adhere to the LA's health and safety policy, procedures and standards as detailed in the [Education Health and Safety Manual](#).

A Health & Safety Governor has been appointed to receive relevant information, monitor the implementation of policies and procedures and to feedback health and safety issues and identified actions to the Governing Body.

The school's Health and Safety Governor is Mrs Eleanor Whalley..

The Finance & Resources Committee will oversee Health & Safety and will receive regular reports from the Headteacher or Business Leader in order to enable them to provide and prioritise resources for health and safety issues.

Responsibilities of the Headteacher:

Overall responsibility for the day to day management of health and safety in accordance with the Governing Body's health and safety policy and procedures rests with the Headteacher, Mr Alf Wood.

The Headteacher has responsibility for:

- Co-operating with the LA and Governing Body to enable health and safety policy and procedures to be implemented and complied with
- Ensuring a timely response to new or temporary Government policy or guidance for schools
- Communicating the policy and other appropriate health and safety information to all relevant people including contractors
- Ensuring effective arrangements are in place to proactively manage health and safety by conducting and reviewing inspections and risk assessments and implementing required actions
- Reporting to the Governing Body on health and safety performance and any safety concerns/ issues which may need to be addressed by the allocation of funds
- Ensuring that the premises, plant and equipment are maintained in a safe and serviceable condition
- Ensuring all staff are competent to carry out their roles and are provided with adequate information, instruction and training

- Ensuring consultation arrangements are in place for staff and their trade union representatives (where appointed) and recognising the right of trade unions in the workplace to require a health and safety committee to be set up
- Monitoring purchasing and contracting procedures to ensure health and safety is included in specifications & contract conditions.

The Headteacher may choose to delegate certain tasks to other members of staff. It is clearly understood by everyone concerned that the delegation of certain duties will not relieve the Headteacher from the overall day to day responsibilities for health and safety within the establishment.

Where required the school will seek specialist advice on health and safety which the establishment may not feel competent to deal with via HCC's Education Health and Safety Team, Tel: 01992 556478.

Responsibilities of other teaching staff / non-teaching staff holding posts of special responsibility

(E.g. Deputy Head, Assistant Head, Business Leader, Facilities Manager, Heads of Faculty, etc.)

- Apply the school's health and safety policy to their own department or area of work
- Ensure staff under their control are aware of and follow relevant published health and safety guidance (from sources such as CLEAPSS, AfPE etc.)
- Ensure health and safety risk assessments are undertaken for the activities for which they are responsible and that identified control measures are implemented which includes trips and visits
- Ensure that appropriate safe working procedures are brought to the attention of all staff under their control
- Take appropriate action on health, safety and welfare issues referred to them, informing the Head or individual with delegated authority of any problems they are unable to resolve within the resources available to them
- Carry out regular inspections of their areas of responsibility and report / record these inspections
- Ensure the provision of sufficient information, instruction, training and supervision to enable staff and pupils to avoid hazards and contribute positively to their own health and safety
- Ensure that all accidents (including near misses) occurring within their area of responsibility are promptly reported and investigated.
- Ensure all up to date paperwork relating to onsite safety is copied to the Facilities Manager Mrs Anna Jones for the school's central Health and Safety file.

Responsibilities of employees

Under the Health and Safety at Work Act 1974 all employees have general health and safety responsibilities. Staff must be aware that they are obliged to take care of their own health and safety whilst at work along with that of others who may be affected by their actions.

All employees have responsibility to -

- Take reasonable care for the health and safety of themselves and others in undertaking their work
- Comply with the school's health and safety policy and procedures at all times including emergency or short-term procedures that may be in place
- Report all accidents and incidents in line with the reporting procedure
- Cooperate with school management on all matters relating to health and safety
- Not to interfere with or misuse any equipment or fittings provided in the interests of health safety and welfare
- Report all defects in condition of premises or equipment and any health and safety concerns immediately to their line manager
- Ensure that they only use equipment or machinery that they are competent / have been trained to use
- Make use of all necessary control measures and personal protective equipment provided for safety or health reasons.

Covid 19

Health and Safety in relation to the covid pandemic is covered by the school's Covid documentation.

APPENDIX 1 – RISK ASSESSMENTS

General Risk Assessments

The school risk assessments will be coordinated by the Facilities Manager, Mrs Anna Jones, following guidance contained in the Education Health and Safety Manual and are approved by the Headteacher.

These risk assessments are available for all staff to view and are held centrally in the school office.

Risk assessments will be reviewed on an annual basis or when the work activity changes, whichever is the soonest and staff are made aware of any changes to risk assessments relating to their work.

Whole School Risk Assessments for specific events

From time to time a risk assessment may be required to ensure the health and safety of the school community, for instance during a pandemic. These risk assessments will be prepared by the Headteacher working with the Business Leader and will be shared across the school community with parents, pupils, staff and governors as well as being published on the school website. Such risk assessments will be reviewed at least termly or when Government or HCC guidance changes.

Individual Risk Assessments

Specific risk assessments relating to individuals, e.g. staff member or young person/pupil are held on that person's file and will be undertaken by the Headteacher.

It is the responsibility of staff to inform their line manager of any medical condition (including pregnancy) which may impact upon their work.

Such risk assessments will be reviewed on a regular basis.

Curriculum Activities

Risk assessments for curriculum activities will be carried out by relevant Heads of Faculty, subject leaders and subject teachers using the relevant codes of practice and model risk assessments developed by national bodies.

Whenever a new course is adopted or developed all activities are checked against these and significant findings incorporated into texts in daily use.

BHGS has a subscription to CLEAPSS and their publications¹ are used as sources of model risk assessment within science and DT.

In addition the following publications are used within the school as sources of model risk assessments:

APPENDIX 2 – OFFSITE VISITS

Full risk assessments must be undertaken for all offsite trips and visits. The member of staff planning the trip will submit all relevant paperwork and risk assessments relating to the trip to the school's Educational Visits Coordinator Mrs Mel Jackson who will check the documentation and planning of the trip and if acceptable, initially approve the visit before referring to the Headteacher.

It is the responsibility of the Head of Faculty to ensure new members of their team understand the risk assessment requirements for trips and visits.

APPENDIX 3 - HEALTH AND SAFETY MONITORING AND INSPECTION

A general inspection of the site will be conducted termly by the Business Leader/Manager and/or Facilities Manager. Monitoring inspections of individual departments will be carried out by Heads of Faculty and Heads of Department on an annual basis and copied to the Business Leader.

A named governor (currently Mrs Eleanor Whalley) will undertake an inspection on an annual basis and report back to both the relevant sub-committee and full Governing Body meetings. This governor monitoring will also cover management systems in addition to inspecting the premises.

Advice and pro forma inspection checklists can be found in the Education Health and Safety Manual.

APPENDIX 4 - FIRE EVACUATION AND OTHER EMERGENCY ARRANGEMENTS

The Headteacher is responsible for ensuring the fire risk assessment is undertaken and implemented following guidance contained in the Education Health and Safety Manual. The school's fire risk assessment was undertaken at the time of the move to the new building and is reviewed and updated annually by the Facilities Manager. In view of the substantial changes to procedures, the implementation of this will be overseen by the Business Leader and the Governor responsible for Health and Safety.

Fire Instructions

These documents are made available to all staff and included in the establishment's induction process (Staff Handbook).

An outline of evacuation procedures is made available to all contractors / visitors and is posted throughout the site.

Emergency exits, fire alarm call points, assembly points etc are clearly identified by safety signs and notices.

EMERGENCY PROCEDURES

Fire and Evacuation

Fire and emergency evacuation procedures are detailed in the staff handbook and a summary posted in each classroom.

Evacuation procedures are also made available to all contractors / visitors.

These procedures will be reviewed at least annually by the Headteacher.

Emergency contact and key holder details are maintained by the Headteacher.

Fire Drills

- Fire drills will be undertaken termly, and a record kept in the fire log book.

Fire Fighting

- The safe evacuation of persons is an absolute priority. Staff may only attempt to deal with small fires, **if it is safe to do so without putting themselves at risk**, using a fire blanket or portable fire fighting equipment.
- Ensure the alarm is raised BEFORE attempting to tackle a fire.
- **Details of service isolation points.** Gas – each room with gas outlets has an emergency shut off button installed. The main gas shut off valve is in the ground floor plant room; Electricity – there are numerous distribution boards around the school. The electrical intake room is accessed on the rear access road in a room between rooms 029 and 028; Water – main stopcock for the whole site is located on the field in the boundary hedge.
- **Details of chemicals and flammable substances on site.** An overall inventory of these will be kept and updated regularly by the Facilities Manager and Science Technician.

APPENDIX 5 - INSPECTION /MAINTENANCE OF EMERGENCY EQUIPMENT

TESTING OF THE FIRE ALARM SYSTEM

Fire alarm call points will be tested weekly by the Site Team and a record of the test submitted to Mitie FM. Normally regular testing of fire alarms will occur on a Friday afternoon.

Any defects on the system will be reported immediately to Mitie FM on 01892 638502 via a member of the Site Team.

INSPECTION OF FIRE FIGHTING EQUIPMENT

Weekly, a member of the Site Team checks that all fire fighting equipment is available for use and operational and for any evidence of tampering.

Defective equipment or extinguishers that need recharging should be taken out of service and reported directly to the Facilities Manager and Business Leader.

EMERGENCY LIGHTING SYSTEMS

Any system that may exist within the school environment will be checked for operation by the Site Team and the outcome of such checks reported to Mitie FM.

MEANS OF ESCAPE

The Site Team will carry out daily checks for any obstructions on exit routes and ensure all final exit doors are operational and available for use. The Facilities Manager will undertake spot checks each half term to ensure fire routes remain clear.

APPENDIX 6 – FIRST AID AND MEDICATION

FIRST AID BOXES ARE LOCATED AT THE FOLLOWING POINTS:

Medical Room off the Reception Office

Site Office

Science prep room

Health office

Food Room

Expressive Arts Office

HOY Office

AUTOMATED EXTERNAL DEFIBRILLATOR (AED)

Medical Room off the Reception Office

Marked Locker in the Sports Hall corridor outside the pupil toilets and changing rooms

Heads of Faculty and First Aiders are responsible for regularly checking that the contents of first aid boxes are complete and replenished as necessary.

The Headteacher will ensure that First Aiders have a current certificate and that new persons are trained should First Aiders leave. All trained First Aiders will be listed in the Staff Handbook, this is denoted by a (*) on the Teaching and Support Staff lists in the Staff Handbook.

First Aiders are responsible for noting their own renewal dates and arranging their own refresher courses accordingly as these must be completed before expiry of the current certificate

Colleagues will check that any school vehicles are properly equipped with first aid boxes before they are used.

Transport to hospital: If the First Aider or Headteacher considers it necessary, the injured person will be sent directly to hospital (normally by ambulance).

Parents / carers will be notified immediately of all major injuries to pupils.

No casualty will be allowed to travel to hospital unaccompanied and an accompanying adult will be designated in situations where the parents cannot be contacted in time.

Where there is any doubt about the appropriate course of action, the first aider will consult with the Health Service helpline on 0800 6441 101 or 111 and, in the case of pupils, with the parents/carers.

Administration of medicines

All medication will be administered to pupils in accordance with the DfE document ***"Managing Medicines in Schools and Early Years Settings"***

The only medication kept and administered within school are those prescribed specifically for a pupil

at the request of the parent / carer and with the consent of the Headteacher. Records of administration will be kept by staff on duty in the Reception Office.

No member of staff should administer any medicines unless a request form has been completed by the parent / carer.

All medications kept in school will be clearly labelled and securely stored in the Medical Room with access strictly controlled. Where children need to have access to emergency medication this will be through the Reception Office First Aiders.

Staff will undergo specific training related to health conditions of pupils and administration of medicines (e.g. diabetes, epilepsy, anaphylaxis etc) as appropriate.

Health Care Plans

Parents / carers are responsible for providing the school with up to date information regarding their child's health care needs and providing appropriate medication.

Individual health care plans are in place for those pupils with significant medical needs e.g. chronic or ongoing medical conditions such as diabetes, asthma, epilepsy, etc.

These plans will be completed at the beginning of the school year / when child enrolls / on diagnosis being communicated to the school and will be reviewed annually by the SENDCO.

All staff are made aware of any relevant health care needs and copies of health care plans are available electronically stored on the G:Drive under !All Staff Shared Medical Care Plans. They are also under Pupil Information on Go4Schools and Arbor.

Staff will receive appropriate training related to health conditions of pupils and the administration of medicines by a health professional as appropriate.

APPENDIX 7 - ACCIDENT REPORTING PROCEDURES

Employees must report accidents, violent incidents, dangerous occurrences, and near misses on the relevant Health and Safety forms.

Copies of these forms are available electronically on the Google Drive.

- A local accident book in the Reception Office is used to record all minor incidents to pupils, any more significant incidents must also be reported to the Admin Manager for further action,
- School accident reports will be monitored for trends by the Admin Manager
- The Headteacher, or their nominee, will investigate accidents and take remedial steps to avoid similar instances recurring. Faulty equipment, systems of work etc. must be reported to the Facilities Manager and attended to as soon as possible.

Reporting to the Health and Safety Executive (HSE)

Incidents involving a fatality or major injury will be reported immediately to the Health and Safety

Executive (HSE) on 0845 300 9923 and the Education Health and Safety team on 01992 556478.

Incidents resulting in the following outcomes must be reported to the HSE via their online reporting system <http://www.hse.gov.uk/riddor/> within 15 days of the incident occurring.

- A pupil or other non-employee being taken directly to hospital for treatment and the accident arising as the result of the condition of the premises / equipment, due to the way equipment or substances were used or due to a lack of supervision / organisation etc.
- Employee absence or inability to carry out their normal duties as the result of a work related accident, for periods of 7 days or more (including W/E's and holidays).

Any incident notified to the HSE must also be reported to the Education Health and Safety Team.

APPENDIX 8 - HEALTH AND SAFETY INFORMATION & TRAINING

Communication of Information

Detailed information on how to comply with HCC's health and safety policy is given in the Education Health and Safety Manual, which is available for reference via the Grid.

The Health and Safety Law poster is displayed in the Staff room.

The Education Health and Safety Team, Tel: 01992 556478 provide competent health and safety advice and the school subscribes to this service.

Health and Safety Training

Health and safety induction training will be provided and documented for all new employees by the Headteacher.

The Headteacher is responsible for ensuring that all staff are provided with adequate information, instruction and training and identifying the health and safety training needs of staff.

All employees will be provided with:

- induction training in the requirements of this policy
- update training in response to any significant change
- training in specific skills needed for certain activities, (e.g. use of hazardous substances, work at height etc)
- refresher training where required.

Training records are held by the Deputy Headteacher who is responsible for coordinating health and safety training needs according to identified priorities.

This includes a system for ensuring that refresher training (for example in first aid) is undertaken within the prescribed time limits.

The Headteacher will be responsible for assessing the effectiveness of training received.

Each member of staff is also responsible for drawing the Headteacher's / Line Manager's attention to their own personal needs for training and for not undertaking duties unless they are confident that they have the necessary competence.

APPENDIX 9 – PERSONAL SAFETY AND LONE WORKING

The school believes that staff should not be expected to put themselves in danger and will not tolerate violent / threatening behaviour to its staff.

Staff will report any such incidents to the Headteacher. The school will work in partnership with the LA and police where inappropriate behaviour/ individual conduct compromises the school's aims in providing an environment in which the pupils and staff feel safe.

Lone Working

Staff are encouraged not to work alone in school. Work carried out unaccompanied or without immediate access to assistance should be risk assessed to determine if the activity is necessary.

Work involving potentially significant risks (for example work at height) **should not** be undertaken whilst working alone.

Where lone working cannot be avoided staff should:

- Obtain the Headteacher's/senior member of staff's permission and notify him/her on each occasion when lone working will occur
- Ensure they do not put themselves or others at risk (Refer to Guidance on Personal Safety in the Health and Safety Manual)
- Ensure they have means to summon help in an emergency e.g. access to a telephone or mobile telephone etc
- When working off site (e.g. when visiting homes) notify a colleague of their whereabouts and the estimated time of return [staff undertaking home visits to obtain as much background information as possible about the child/family being visited]
- Key holders attending empty premises where there has been an incident or suspected crime should do so with a colleague if possible. They should not enter the premises unless they are sure it is safe to do so
- Report any incidents or situations where they may have felt "uncomfortable".

APPENDIX 10 - PREMISES AND WORK EQUIPMENT

Statutory inspections

Regular inspection and testing of school equipment is conducted by appropriate contractors according to timescales specified. Records of such monitoring will be kept by the Facilities Manager and copies given to the Business Leader.

The Facilities Manager is responsible for liaising with Mitie FM to ensure all statutory inspections are undertaken and documented. It will be the contractor's responsibility to ensure that any training or instruction needs for their team are met, personal protective equipment requirements are identified and relevant risk assessments conducted.

All staff are required to report to the Facilities Manager any problems found with plant/equipment. Defective equipment will be clearly marked and taken out of service by storing in a secure location pending repair / disposal.

Curriculum areas

Heads of Faculty and Subject Leaders are responsible for ensuring maintenance requirements for equipment in their areas are identified and implemented.

Electrical safety

All staff should monitor the condition of plugs, cables and electrical equipment and conduct a quick visual inspection prior to use. Defective equipment will be reported to the Facilities Manager.

All portable items of electrical equipment will be subject to formal inspection and testing (Portable Appliance Testing (PAT)) on an identified cycle (dependent upon the type of equipment and the environment it is used in). This inspection and testing will be conducted by a specialist contractor. Between such PAT tests, the Site Team are responsible for termly visual inspection of appliances and any concerns should be raised to the Facilities Manager.

The Facilities Manager is responsible for keeping an up-to-date inventory of all relevant electrical appliances and for ensuring that all equipment is available for testing when it falls due.

Personal items of equipment (electrical or mechanical) should not be brought into the school without prior authorisation and subjected to the same tests as school equipment.

Major fixed wiring circuits will be checked every five years by Mitie FM.

APPENDIX 11 - FLAMMABLE AND HAZARDOUS SUBSTANCES

Every attempt will be made to avoid, or choose the least harmful of, substances which fall under the ***“Control of Substances Hazardous to Health Regulations 2002”*** (the COSHH Regulations).

Within curriculum areas Heads of Faculty and Subject Leaders are responsible for the control of substances hazardous to health and ensuring that model risk assessments contained in the relevant national publications (CLEAPSS, Association for Science Education's "Topics in Safety" etc.) are in place.

In all other areas the establishment's nominated person(s) responsible for substances hazardous to health is the Facilities Manager.

They shall ensure:

- an inventory of all hazardous substances used on site is compiled and regularly reviewed
- material safety data sheets are obtained from the relevant supplier for all such materials
- risk assessments are conducted for the use of hazardous substances (where generic risk assessments are available e.g. for products purchased from Hertfordshire Supplies, these are adapted to suit specific use of material on site)
- where required COSHH risk assessments are conducted and that these assessments are seen and understood by those staff that are exposed to the product/substance
- all chemicals are appropriately and securely stored out of the reach of children
- all chemicals are kept in their original packaging and labelled (no decanting into unmarked containers)
- hazardous substances are disposed of in the appropriate way
- suitable personal protective equipment (PPE) has been identified and available for use. PPE is to be provided free of charge where the need is identified as part of the risk assessment.

Where persons may be affected by their use on site, the Facilities Manager is responsible for ensuring that COSHH assessments are available from contractors (*this applies to both regular contracts such as cleaners and caterers and from builders, decorators, flooring specialists, etc*).

RADIOACTIVE SOURCES

The school follows CLEAPSS guidance L93 in Managing Ionising radiations and Radioactive sources.

- The school's Radiation Protection Officer is Subject Leader for KS4 Science, currently Mr James Short;
- CLEAPSS provide the Radiation Protection Adviser (RPA) service for HCC
- The school's Radiation Protection Officer is responsible for ensuring all records pertaining to radioactive sources are maintained.

APPENDIX 12 - LIFTING AND HANDLING

Generic risk assessments for regular manual handling operations are undertaken by the Facilities Manager and all site staff are provided with information on safe moving and handling techniques.

Staff should ensure they are not lifting heavy items and equipment unless they have received

training and/or equipment in order to do so safely.

All manual handling activities which present a significant risk to the health and safety of staff, will be reported to the Facilities Manager and where such activities cannot be avoided a risk assessment will be conducted to ensure such risks are adequately controlled. A copy of this assessment will be provided to employees who must follow the instruction given when carrying out the task.

Paediatric Moving and Handling

All staff who move and handle pupils have received appropriate training (both in general moving and handling people techniques and specific training on any lifting equipment, hoists, slings etc. they are required to use).

All moving and handling of pupils has been risk assessed and recorded by a competent member of staff.

Equipment for moving and handling people in the Hygiene Room is subject to inspection on a 6 monthly basis by Mitie FM.

APPENDIX 13 - CONTRACTORS

All contractors used by the school shall ensure compliance with relevant health and safety legislation, guidance and good practice.

All contractors must report to the School Reception where they will be asked to sign in using the Inventory online system and wear an identification badge. Contractors will be issued with guidance on fire procedures, local management arrangements and vehicle movement restrictions, as necessary.

The Facilities Manager is responsible for monitoring areas where the contractor's work may directly affect staff and pupils and for keeping records of all contractor work.

School managed projects

Where the school undertakes projects, these are managed by the Business Leader or Facilities Manager who will ensure all statutory approvals, such as planning permission and building regulations have been sought. This would include whether CDM² regulations will apply.

To ensure contractor competency the school will use suitably registered contractors.

Contractors will be asked to provide risk assessments and method statements specific to the site and works to be undertaken. The school, contractor(s) and any subcontractor(s) involved will agree the risk assessment and safe systems of work to be used prior to works commencing on site.

² CDM refers to the Construction (Design and Management) Regulations 2007 and apply to any building, demolition, maintenance or refurbishment work.

Such projects are notifiable to the HSE where the work exceeds 30 days or involves more than 500 person days of work. In addition two specific and specialist roles of CDM Co-ordinator and principal contractor must be appointed. In such instances it is recommended that an agent be used to work on the schools behalf.

APPENDIX 14 - WORK AT HEIGHT

Working at height can present a significant risk, where such activities cannot be avoided a risk assessment will be conducted to ensure such risks are adequately controlled. A copy of this assessment will be provided to employees authorised to work at height by the Facilities Manager.

When working at height (including accessing storage or putting up displays) appropriate stepladders or kick stools are to be used. Staff must not climb onto chairs, tables or other furniture.

Only those persons who have been trained to use ladders safely may use them.

Basic instruction is provided to all staff who use ladders / stepladders

Formal training on work at height, use of ladders, mobile tower scaffolds etc. will be provided where a significant risk is identified as part of an individual's role e.g. site team, drama, ICT technician etc.

The establishment's nominated person(s) responsible for work at height is the Facilities Manager.

The nominated person(s) shall ensure:

- all work at height is properly planned and organised
- the use of access equipment is restricted to authorised users
- all those involved in work at height are trained and competent to do so
- the risks from working at height are assessed and appropriate equipment selected
- a register of access equipment is maintained and all equipment is regularly inspected and maintained
- any risks from fragile surfaces is properly controlled.

APPENDIX 15 - DISPLAY SCREEN EQUIPMENT (DSE)

All staff who use computers as a significant part of their normal work (significant is taken to be continuous / near continuous spells of an hour at a time) e.g. admin staff, finance staff etc may have a DSE assessment carried out by the Facilities Manager.

Those staff identified as DSE users shall be entitled to an eyesight test for DSE use every 2 years by a qualified optician.

Advice on the use of DSE is available in the Education Health and Safety Manual.

APPENDIX 16 - VEHICLES ON SITE

Vehicular access to the school is restricted to school staff and visitors only.

The access from the road shall be kept clear for emergency vehicles.

The vehicle access gate must not normally be used for pedestrian access.

Once the building works are complete there will be a drive through drop off zone available to parents in the mornings. Parking in this area will be strictly prohibited during school operation.

APPENDIX 17 - LETTINGS / SHARED USE OF PREMISES

Lettings are managed by the Facilities and Lettings Co-ordinator, currently Mrs Gillian Martin.

APPENDIX 18 - MINIBUSES

The school owns and runs its own minibus.

All minibus drivers are responsible for the undertaking of visual checks on and the operation of minibuses before their planned journey. All journeys to be logged (log book held in the minibus) and any defects reported to the minibus's home school office.

Faculties are required to make their own arrangements regarding the booking of minibuses.

APPENDIX 19 - STRESS / WELLBEING

The school and Governing Body are committed to promoting high levels of health and well-being and recognise the importance of identifying and reducing workplace stressors through risk assessment (ref school's Health and Attendance and Stress and Well-being Policies)

APPENDIX 20 - LEGIONELLA

The school complies with advice on the potential risks from legionella as identified in the Education Health and Safety Manual.

A water risk assessment of the school has been completed by Mitie FM who are responsible for the organisation of ongoing checks. Where the Site Team is required to undertake this activity, Mitie FM will provide them with the details of the tasks and dates and following completion the Site Team will update the records held with the IFM helpdesk.

Operational checks to be undertaken by the Site Team under the advice of Mitie FM include:

- identifying and flushing rarely used outlets on a weekly basis and after school holiday periods
- conducting necessary water temperature checks (monthly)
- disinfecting /descaling showers, or other areas where water droplets are formed (quarterly)
- water tanks being inspected for compliance and safety on an annual basis.

APPENDIX 21 – WORK EXPERIENCE

A designated member of school staff is responsible for managing and coordinating work related learning within the school, currently Mrs Vicky Langston.

The school retains a duty of care for all pupils undertaking work experience and must ensure the placement is appropriate, therefore:

- All pupils are briefed before taking part in work experience on supervision arrangements and health and safety responsibilities

- All placements (including private placements) are subject to pre-placement checks, an appropriate third party will be used for assessing the suitability of all placements, eg. The Chamber of Commerce. No work experience placement will go ahead if deemed unsuitable
- Every pupil will receive a placement job description highlighting tasks to be undertaken and any necessary health and safety information which is passed onto the parent / carer
- Arrangements will be in place to visit or telephone placements in order to monitor pupils during the placement
- Emergency contact arrangements will be established prior to the event (including out of school hours provision) in order that a member of school staff can be contacted should an incident occur
- All incidents involving pupils on work placement activities will be reported to the placement organiser.

APPENDIX 22 - LIGHTNING

1. Purpose of policy:

Lightning is the most dangerous and frequently encountered thunderstorm hazard that people experience every year. The purpose of this policy is to ensure proper education and prevention protocols are in place for the health and safety of our staff, students and visitors. Lightning injuries are one of the top ten causes of sport related death. As such, it is imperative to take the proper steps to prevent injuries from this potential hazard.

2. Policy statement:

This policy describes the best practice procedures for the prevention, monitoring, and when necessary, the treatment of lightning related injuries for the staff, students and visitors of Bishop's Hatfield Girls' School.

This policy will be a living, working document that is continually reviewed and updated yearly as the organisation and our community changes.

The key message in case of possible lightning in the area is, **"if thunder roars, go indoors"**.

3. Definitions:

- *Safe Structure*— The safest structure is a fully enclosed, substantial building (one that has plumbing or electrical wiring). Fully-enclosed metal vehicles such as cars or school buses are also safe structures from the lightning threat.
- *Unsafe structures* – Generally, any structure in the open air is unsafe, such as dugouts, goals, golf carts, etc. High places are also unsafe, avoid areas near trees, lamp posts, fences, and towers. Large bodies of water, including most outside swimming pools are not safe from the danger of lightning injury. Research has shown that using or being in close proximity to plumbing (sinks, showers, baths) or wiring (land-line phone, computer that is plugged in, appliances, etc.) can be unsafe from lightning danger.

- *Weather watchers* – An adult designated per venue, as the responsible person for monitoring the environment, initiating the 30-minute delay rule and for determining safe resumption of outdoor activities.
- *Lightning* – any lightning is dangerous.

4. Scope:

This policy applies to all staff members of Bishop's Hatfield Girls' School who are associated with activities where lightning injuries pose a risk including the supervision of pupils who may be outside during lunch and break. This policy also applies to leaders of clubs using the school facilities, athletic participants and spectators of organised events.

5. Procedures:

Monitor Weather Conditions

1. PE Staff must check weather reports each day before any practice or event if there are reports of bad weather or weather alerts.
2. Designated personnel should utilise reliable weather monitoring systems (BBC Weather app, AccuWeather etc) to monitor the likelihood of severe weather in the area

Evacuation Criteria

1. The following table identifies the person, or their designee, who is responsible for making the determination for when to evacuate the area. This person must have recognised and unchallengeable authority to suspend activity.

2. Lacking reliable, real-time technology that has been independently verified, evacuate when thunder is heard or when lightning is observed “hear it clear it, see it flee it.”
3. Loudspeaker, “this is a weather warning, please come inside immediately, lightning may be approaching”
4. All individuals must be completely within an identified safe structure when thunderstorms are already producing lightning and when the leading edge of the lightning storm is visible or audible

Identification of Safe Structures

PE staff are responsible for the identification of safe structure for evacuation

- a. A safe structure is identified as a substantial, fully enclosed building with wiring and plumbing
- b. A safe structure may include an enclosed vehicle (e.g. team bus) when not enough (or no) fully enclosed building are an option

Venue	Safe structure from Lightning	Approximate walking time from Field/MUGA to safer structure
BHGS	Main School Building	3 minutes

Resumption of activities

Activities should be suspended until 30 minutes after the last lightning strike is seen **and** after the last sound of thunder is seen. The 30-minute clock restarts for each lightning flash observed and each time thunder is heard.

Treatment

1. If an individual is struck by lightning, first aid responders will designate an individual to follow first aid procedures and call 999 to summon Emergency Services
2. Assess the scene and only approach a lightning victim if the area is safe (no danger of lightning to the rescuer)
3. Move patients to a safer structure (if needed)
4. Evaluate and treat for apnea (cessation of breathing) and absence of heartbeat (cardiac arrest). An AED should be applied to anyone who appears to be unconscious, pulseless, apneic
5. Assess level of consciousness
6. Evaluate and treat for possibility of injuries from lightning (fractures, etc.)

Fire

Should a lightning strike cause a fire, then dial 999 to alert the Emergency Services and follow the fire procedures as outlined in the Fire Evacuation Plan.
