Bishop's #BEST - Fundraising

I am very concerned about the impact on our overall budget and so we really do need your help.

Free School Meals

As stated above, we know that many families have suffered financial difficulties in recent times and encourage them to check their eligibility for Free School Meals (FSM). You can do this here Free school meals. The funding is allocated to a pupil's Wisepay lunch account and so they simply use their thumb to pay for lunch, alongside everyone else. Even if this is only required for a short period of time it is still worth applying as this will trigger Pupil Premium funding to the school which can be used to subsidise things like school trips and visits, books and equipment and uniform. We are pleased to announce that we have a new catering company, Innovate, starting with us after Easter. We are really encouraged by the enthusiasm and energy they are bringing to redesign the catering area and to the new, fresh, healthier menu they will introduce. Year 7 and Sixth Form Admissions

Secondary school allocations took place a few weeks ago and you may have read in the press about the decline in pupil numbers in some areas. Bishop's had over 500 applications for 155 places, with 226 of these placing Bishop's as first choice. I am told that we are one of the most oversubscribed schools in the County and we have a waiting list for places in all year groups.

I am also pleased to see that we are getting record numbers of applications from external candidates wanting to join our Sixth Form. Those applying from other schools remark upon our strong academic record but also on the extensive number of extra-curricular opportunities we offer. They also comment on the inclusive environment and on the range of leadership roles that give students the confidence to take the next steps after leaving school. The Department for Education recently published performance data for school Sixth Forms and **Bishop's was placed in the top 10% of schools in the country for A Level results**. This is a testament to the dedication and hard work of students and staff. Academic results are not everything though, and I am equally proud of the contribution our students make, in and out of school, giving me optimism that they will go on to make a really positive contribution to society when they leave us.

Social Media

Social media is obviously a great way to stay in touch and communicate. It is also something that there are increasing concerns about in relation to young people's wellbeing. I am sure that many of you will have seen news stories or watched recent television dramas that highlight these concerns. As a school we do work hard to educate our pupils about the use of social media, in particular the dangers of getting involved in any form of inappropriate communication. It is obviously impossible for us to 'police' this at school and so we do ask all parents to spend time monitoring their child's social media accounts and Apps. As a school we strongly advise that pupils do not have access to phones or other technology after a certain cut off time each evening. There is growing evidence that allowing teenagers to have access to these devices overnight is damaging to their wellbeing as this is often when the most inappropriate content is shared which also leads to highly disrupted sleep patterns.

Uniform

As we move into the summer term I am giving the usual reminder about uniform, make-up and jewellery. The vast majority of our pupils adhere to our expectations really well. Please do support the school by:

- not allowing your child to get a nose piercing or multiple ear piercings, until they join the
 6th Form
- not allowing them to have nail extensions or eyelash extensions
- not allowing them to dye their hair unnatural colours
- ensuring that they have skirt of an appropriate length
- not allowing them to wear items of jewellery apart from a watch

We will confiscate items that are not permitted and on rare occasions have had to send pupils home if they do not comply with our expectations. This can be both embarrassing and inconvenient for parents/carers.

Attendance

I would like to remind you of our expectations in relation to pupil attendance. As we move into the latter half of the summer term we can receive requests from parents and carers to authorise additional days of holiday due to trips or flights being arranged before the school term has come to an end. Please can we remind you that these requests will not be authorised. We believe it gives an important message to the pupils that at Bishop's we take advantage of all the learning time we are allocated. This does not change as we approach the end of the school year. Our staff continue to prepare and deliver high standards of learning in the classroom right up until the end of term and if pupils do not attend school for those last few lessons of the year then they will miss out on these learning opportunities.

We also want to remind you that this academic year the Department for Education updated the statutory requirements regarding morning and afternoon attendance marks. Please note that if a pupil arrives after 9.10 a.m. without a valid reason for lateness then they are marked as U-unauthorised lateness, which is the same as an unauthorised absence being recorded for the whole morning. Please could you also ensure that when you contact the school to report your child's absence that you provide a clear explanation for the absence. One word explanations such as 'unwell' make it difficult for the attendance team to code absences appropriately within DFE guidelines.

Communication with school

The partnership between home and school makes all the difference to our pupils' successes and we do our very best to build positive relationships with everyone in our community. It is perhaps a sign of the times we are living in that at a recent Headteacher Conference I attended a whole session was devoted to managing parental complaints. I completely respect any parent or carer's right to raise a concern with the school and I am always open to suggestions for how we can improve. However, we seem to be increasingly living in a world where people are quick to blame and make accusations without taking the time to consider whether this is the best way to achieve a desired outcome. There will inevitably be times when staff get things wrong, just as we have all made mistakes as parents/carers; we are humans not robots. The best way to resolve issues is to work with us, not against us, so please bear this in mind in your communications with the school. I would ask that when raising concerns you are mindful of this and do so in a spirit of enquiry rather than confrontation and accusation.

I would particularly urge parents/carers to consider carefully whether your child's account of events at school may be the full picture. All pupils will have good days and bad days at school and research shows that the teenage brain is often emotional rather than rational. No doubt on occasion these emotions will be played out at home, with your child complaining about or criticising things that have happened at school. There will also be times when this is an attempt by the child to deflect from something they have themselves done wrong. It is often very tempting to jump in to try to fix these problems or to place blame. Obviously it is very important that you listen to your child. However, when taking their account do please consider that this may not be the full story and I would urge you to pause before accusing the school or staff of mishandling things. We can only resolve problems if we work together and jumping to conclusions about what has happened purely based on what your child has told you is not supporting the school but potentially undermining what we do. This can also cause some embarrassment to parents when they become aware of the full story.
